# Did you know?

Easter Sunday falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after March 20, the nominal date of the Spring Equinox. Easter Sunday can fall on any date from March 22 to April 25. The year-to-year sequence is so complicated that it takes 5.7 million to repeat. Eastern Orthodox churches sometimes celebrate Easter on the same day as the rest of Christendom. However, if that dates does not follow Passover, then the Orthodox churches delay their Easter - sometimes by over a month.
